- 10 New York City, allow me to say: Well played.
- 11 She seems particularly suited to these times. She provides a certain authenticity and
- 12 clarity of self in a time of uncertainty, projecting a casual grace onto a world of
- anxiety. She has become a powerful symbol of fearlessness, refinement, frugality and
- frivolity, managing to be both fun and serious simultaneously. She's genuinely human.

- then Michelle Obama is becoming the first lady we most want to have a laugh with.

- 4 What word class does *coolest* belong to and which form does the word have here?
- 5 Give examples from this text of a) a proper noun, b) a common noun, c) a noun used as a countable and d) one used as an uncountable.

- 6 Lines 8-10 contain different adverbials functioning as adjunct, disjunct and conjunct.
 Find examples of all three types and explain how they differ in function.
 7 This text has some features of language that are fairly formal but others that are on the
- informal side. Give examples of each type.
